It prepares students for public or private sector careers within the criminal justice field.

Law and Justice Courses

- Introduction to Criminal Justice provides an introduction to the American system of criminal justice. The crime problem, the police, the judicial system and correctional facilities and theories are examined. Both the legal and behavioral aspects of each stage of the criminal justice process are discussed and analyzed.
- Introduction to Legal Studies provides an introduction to the American legal system. The course provides a brief history on the process and procedures by which the legal system was developed, how laws are created and how laws are organized. Students understand the different sources of law, the different levels of law and the interplay that occurs when different laws regulate the same matters. This course includes a field trip to the Constitution Center, Independence Hall, City Hall, and the Liberty Bell pavilion.
- Policing and Police Practice provides an introduction to a range of historical, political and sociological problems in institutions vested with the responsibility to enforce laws and/ or preserve order. Emphasis is also placed on the study of the relationship between police and the communities in which they serve.
